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Sexting Prevention advice for parents, children and young people

Information

Description

The term "sexting" is a blend of 'sex' and 'texting' and refers to the sending of sexually explicit photos or videos of oneself using a computer or smartphone. Such material may include photos of people in swimwear and/or underwear or nude images of certain parts of the body, such as topless shots.

Legal classification

If you receive sexually explicit pictures and then forward them to someone else without the consent of those depicted, you will be in contravention of the'**right to one's own image' doctrine under** Sections 22 and 23 of the German Art Copyright Act (*KunstUrhG*) read with Section 33 of the Act) and possibly also the '**intimate privacy**' rule within the meaning of Section 201a of the German Criminal Code (*StGB*).

What to do if photos/videos are circulated without your consent?

- Report photos/videos to the relevant service provider. and have them removed.
- > Contact a lawyer to claim a violation of the right to your own image, on the grounds that nobody is allowed to pass on photos or videos without the consent of the person depicted.
- > File a complaint with the police if photos/videos that violate your 'intimate privacy' have been forwarded without your consent. This refers to images taken in the private sphere, such as your own home, toilet or shower.

Preventive action

- > Educate your children about the potential dangers of sexting. Once a photo has been sent digitally, its distribution can neither be controlled nor stopped.
- > To protect against unwanted distribution, it is best not to create or share such images in the first place.
